Author's Event

On Wednesday evening, October 4th, the Library hosted an intimate and engaging authors' event sponsored by the Friends. The conversation between Sarah McCraw Crow--Canterbury resident and author of The Wrong Kind of Woman--and Amy Makechnie--Andover resident and author of The Unforgettable Guinevere St Clair, Ten Thousand Tries, and the forthcoming McNifficents--was filled with insightful reflections and inspired lots of laughs. Facilitated by Proctor Academy English teacher, John Bouton, and propelled by great questions from the audience, the animated and honest discussion revealed many connections between the two writers. The topics of conversation were fluid and broad; the two compared notes on the origin of complex characters and life after having gotten to "know" them, the roles of various players in the development and publication of a book, the balance of creativity and family life, and the combination of confidence and uncertainty that can come with success.



Interview with Ben Cote of Youth Services



Ben Cote is the Head of Youth Services at TML. A native of Newport, Ben has been involved with public libraries from the age of 15. He worked at the Richards Free Library in Newport and served on the Board of Trustees. In June of 2018, he became Head of Youth Services at TML and guided the program through some very trying years.

Q. There has been a resurgence in library usage this year. What are you seeing in youth services?

We've seen a substantial increase in the number of young people using our resources. During Covid we tried doing on-line programs, but my sense was that kids were "screened out." We are now approaching the usage levels of 2 years ago.

Q. How was attendance at TML's summer programs?

Great. We had three summer performances for kids, all well attended. The highlight was the Whale Mobile – a replica of an actual whale that kids could walk through. We had 80 people signed up for the Whale. The Pop-Up Crafts program was held on the lawn in front of the library was popular with teens. Story Time outside in the garden attracted 50 people, and our Book Bike reached many patrons at Windy Hill and Elkins Beach.

Q. How does Youth Services utilize technology?

In Youth Services we have Chrome Boxes and Chrome books. Young patrons can use Chrome to access the internet with open access. The Chrome devices are utilized daily at TML by teens for school assignments and just for recreation.

Q. What is coming up in the fall for Youth Services?

Recently, we had our "Back to School" open house where students were able to sign up for a free library card. As a reminder, any student in the Kearsarge School district can get a free TML library card. We'll continue with Story Time on Wednesdays and have added Take and Make Crafts as a take home project to complement each week's story. And, of course, we have Lego Club every Tuesday.

Q. What are you goals for the coming year?

I would like to attract more teens to the library – make it a space where everyone feels welcome. In the past we have had Game Days and Movie Days for teens – I would like to bring those programs back.

Q. Final thoughts?

The library has a wide variety of resources for kids and teens – not just books but technology, games, movies and programs. And we have a staff of youth services assistants dedicated to helping kids and teens. There's something here for everybody.

"I wanted to do something to support the rebuilding of the community."






Kathy Bartlett - Youth Services Assistant
